THE DALLAS ARBORETUM ONE-MILE FITNESS TRAIL


Now, you can walk the prettiest mile in Dallas! Our one-mile fitness trail begins and ends at the Main Gate. Follow the trail to better health and you'll be surrounded by beauty all year long! The trail leads you down the Paseo de Flores, around the Fogelson Fountain and into the renowned Jonsson Color Garden. *Let nature nurture you and your health!* Become a regular walker at the Arboretum.

THE DeGOLYER HOME

This 21,000 square-foot home was built in 1940 for petroleum geologist Everette L. DeGolyer and his wife, Nell. Mr. DeGolyer, who pioneered new methods of locating petroleum, acquired thousands of books in his lifetime. His impressive library held 15,000 volumes and is a featured attraction of the home today. When Mrs. DeGolyer died in 1972, the estate was given to Southern Methodist University, which later sold it to the City of Dallas. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. The home is open for tours starting at 10am with the last tour beginning at 4pm.

THE CAMP HOUSE

Better known to local visitors as the Camp House, this 8,000 square-foot home commands a stunning view of White Rock Lake from atop a gently sloping hill. It was built in 1938 for Alex and Roberta Camp, by John Staub of Houston. Ownership was then transferred to several charitable organizations until it was purchased by the Dallas Arboretum, through the immeasurable help of Ralph B. Rogers and restored by the Eugene McDermott Foundation. The home is closed to the public, however, the downstairs is available for rental.



PASEO DE FLORES

The Paseo is the central walkway of the Dallas Arboretum. This meandering pathway, designed by Luis Santana, begins near Woolf Circle, and concludes near the circular Fogelson Fountain.

JONSSON COLOR GARDEN

Designed by Naud Burnett, this 6.5-acre garden is planted with more than 2,000 varieties of azaleas and thousands of seasonal annuals. In spring, daffodils, tulips, and dogwood bloom lavishly. Summer brings canna and caladiums, and in the fall the garden is lush with chrysanthemums.

PALMER FERN DELL

This enchanting one-acre mini-garden, designed by Naud Burnett, is located within the Jonsson Color Garden and features more than 100 varieties of ferns, in addition to camellias, witch hazel, azaleas and mature trees. Palmer Fern Dell is a welcome oasis during the summer months, as a micro-fine mist system regularly blankets the garden.



A WOMAN'S GARDEN

This 1.8-acre formal garden was a gift to the Arboretum by its Women's Council. It is comprised of several small gardens and features a reflecting pool that provides a water-on-water view overlooking tranquil White Rock Lake.

DeGOLYER GARDENS

The 4.5-acre DeGolyer Gardens were designed in 1940 by landscape architects Arthur and Marie Berger. Noted features today include the Sunken Garden, the Arboretum Gazebo, and Magnolia Allée.

LAY ORNAMENTAL GARDEN

This 2.2-acre Texas cottage garden, designed by landscape architects Armstrong - Berger, is filled with hundreds of perennials. You'll know you've arrived when you see the dramatic falling water curtain set against native limestone walls. Look for a collection of bronze wildlife figures donated by the Trammell Crow Family.

THE TRIAL GARDENS

The Trial Gardens were created to expand our research efforts and provide educational opportunities to the public. Working with Texas A&M University, we test plants in the North Central Texas climate and provide this information to plant producers and gardeners.

HERB GARDEN

Adjacent to the Camp House, the Herb Garden features more than 200 varieties of perennial and seasonal herbs.

CAMELLIA GARDEN

Our delightful Southern accent is the Martha Brooks Camellia Garden. This intimate area features more than 200 exquisite camellias of 30 different cultivars.

TEXAS PIONEER ADVENTURE

This national award winning 2.5-acre exhibit features seven gardens that introduce the importance of plants for pioneer survival. It includes an authentic sod house, two replica cabins, a covered wagon, Native American tepee and interactive exhibits.
